A special, NEW two-hour program to assist students and parents in looking for ways to pay for a college education aired January 29 on ETV. The repeat broadcasts are NOT interactive with call-in and e-mail questions, but the information is very useful to high school students and parents.

**Finding Money for College** features financial aid professionals from public and private colleges and universities in our state and representatives from the SC Higher Education Tuition Grants and the SC Commission on Higher Education who provide information on scholarships, grants and loans.

This year's program features a special segment on high school guidance services to help students find financial help that was taped at **Wando High School** in the Charleston County School District.

# IMPORTANT: Block Feeds of Series with “Limited” Rights

The following series have “limited broadcast/off-air record rights and no duplication rights,” which means that eMedia is limited to the number of times we can broadcast these series. We cannot repeat these series again this school year. All broadcast on IMC. These series are also available online in *StreamlineSC*.

- **20<sup>th</sup> Century Turning Points in US History** (Grades 7–12, 8 lessons) – This series is designed to provide a clear overview of the people and events that distinguished the 20<sup>th</sup> century. **Repeats Feb. 6, 3:35–7:50 p.m.**
- **America’s Quest for Freedom** (Grades 5–12, 9 lessons) – This series focuses on America’s struggle for freedom for all, dramatizing common history and showing events that increased freedom. **Repeats Feb. 7, 3:30–7:16 p.m.**
- **Becoming a Better Me** (Grades K–5, 8 lessons) – This series helps students build self confidence, responsibility, self esteem, and self control. **Repeats Feb. 7, 10:30 a.m.–12:55 p.m.**
- **Becoming Successful in Middle School - 1 and 2** (Grades 4–8, 16 lessons) – These address important concerns that young teens deal with like peer pressure, decision-making, study skills, and rules of common courtesy. **Repeats Feb. 8, 3:00–9:48 p.m.**
- **(NEW) Bullying and Cyber Safety** (HRM) (Grades 5–12, 3 lessons) - This series contains three programs that each address an important topic for today’s youth: texting, Internet safety and bullying situations. **Airs Feb. 8, 10:50 a.m.–12:01 p.m.**
- **Connect with Kids At-Risk** (Grades 6–12, 6 lessons) – This series features true stories and real kids in peer-to-peer format that focuses on at-risk issues that teens face everyday. **Repeats Feb. 9, 9:10–11:24 a.m.**
- **Exploring Healthy Choices** (Grades 6–12, 6 lessons) – This series teaches students vital information concerning key areas of their health, including proper nutrition and suicide prevention. **Repeats Feb. 9, 3:00–5:41 p.m.**
- **Great Campaigns of the Civil War** (Grades 6–12, 4 lessons) – This series uses realistic reenactments of the pivotal battles in the Civil War, along with letters, speeches and diaries to humanize the struggle. **Repeats Feb. 10, 10:05 a.m.–12:03 p.m.**
- **(NEW) History of Black Achievement in America, A** (Grades 6–12, 8 lessons) - This series documents Black Achievement in American history, its defining role in the growth of the country, and its influence on events by highlighting contributions of Black Americans that have over 350 years influenced our culture, enriched our society with their achievements, and shaped the history of the U.S. **Airs Feb. 2, 8:00 a.m.–12:06 p.m.**
- **(NEW) History of Hispanic Achievement in America, A** (Grades 6–12, 8 lessons) - History of Hispanic Achievement in America began 500 years ago when Columbus stepped ashore in the new world. The contributions of Hispanics to the development and success of America are key to our history. **Airs Feb. 2, 1:10–5:35 p.m.**
- **History of Women’s Achievement in America, A** (Grades 5–12, 8 lessons) – This series celebrates women’s contributions to American history from the 17<sup>th</sup> century to present day. **Repeats Feb. 13, 9:50 a.m.–2:13 p.m.**
- **Nutrition Basics: Why Food Matters** (Grades 4–12, 7 lessons) – This series covers nutrition from A to Z and includes the food pyramid, which focuses on the importance of physical activity. **Repeats Feb. 13, 6:00–7:20 p.m.**
- **Primary Citizenship** (Grades 1–3, 7 lessons) – This series told by a primary child, gives children the major ideas and experiences that they should acquire to be effective citizens. **Repeats Feb. 8, 12:50–1:59 p.m.**
- **Technology and Architecture in Ancient Civilizations** (Grades 7–12, 3 lessons) – This series shows how to look at technology and architecture to find out what an ancient civilization was like. **Repeats Feb. 13, 7:30–9:08 p.m.**
- **U.S. History Field Trips** (Grades 4–8, 8 lessons) – This series covers some of the most widely taught, standards-based topics in elementary-middle school American history and geography, making them come to life. **Repeats Feb. 13, 4:00–7:37 p.m.**

### The Struggle Continues: Black Women in American Culture and History

Feb. 19, 5:00–6:30 p.m. ETV-HD

The 25th Annual Black History Teleconference will be held on the campus of Benedict College in Columbia on Wednesday, February 15. It will be taped at this time to air on ETV February 19. *Black Women in American Culture and History* features five high school students and one Benedict student who direct questions to six prominent African Americans about their ideas, challenges and achievements in relation to the national theme that comes from the Association for the Study of African American Life and History in Washington, DC. High school students participating are from A.C. Flora, C. A. Johnson, Lower Richland, Richland Northeast, and W. J. Keenan High Schools.

Guest panelists include Mrs. Leona Barr Davenport, Director, Atlanta Business League, Inc.; Dr. Keith Gilyard, International President of the National Council of Teachers of English, Urbana, Illinois; The Honorable Kamala Harris, Attorney General of the State of California, Sacramento, California; Dr. Ingrid Saunders Jones, Senior Vice President, The Coca-Cola Company; Mr. Robert L. Reed, Former Lineman, The National Football League and a former corporate vice president, Saratoga Springs, New York; Mrs. Lavada Watson, Senior Vice President, Colgate-Palmolive Company, New York.

The program was developed by executive producer Dr. Marianna White Davis, special assistant to Dr. David H. Swinton, president of Benedict College. Dr. Davis is an English teacher, lecturer, researcher, and writer. Dr. William "Sonny" Walker of Atlanta, Georgia is the moderator. **Road Trip! Through South Carolina Civil Rights History** brings a fresh approach to teaching history to technologically aware children. Students use these virtual instruments to "travel" back in time to learn about historical events, places and people that played an important role during the civil rights movement in South Carolina from the 1940's through the early 1970s. ## Colonial Williamsburg Electronic Field Trips 2011–12 Feb. 16 at 1:00 p.m. on ETV – *When Freedom Came* (Premiere)

Students can discover how enslaved Americans made choices every day during the Civil War that helped bring about their freedom

The CWEFT programs use 21<sup>st</sup> century technology to enrich the teaching of history and social studies, making the subjects exciting and relevant to today's classrooms. The field trips are correlated to national standards and provide a dramatic and compelling learning experience for 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students. Though schools may view the programs free and record them with 10-day fair use rights (can tape and use for 10 days from broadcast date, but must erase tape within 45 days), there are definite advantages to paying the fee to Colonial Williamsburg to participate.

By paying the fee to participate, schools get the outstanding teacher materials, get to keep the recorded program for the life of the tape and have access to the re-enactors and historians online and via a toll-free number. Schools pay approximately \$500 per school for all seven programs, but rights for individual programs can be purchased. - Feb. 16, 2012 ***When Freedom Came* (premiere)** – Everyone knows Abraham Lincoln freed all the slaves or did he? Freedom came to enslaved people over the course of many months and years – and it arrived in different ways in different places. Discover how enslaved Americans made choices every day during the Civil War that helped bring about their freedom.
- Mar. 15, 2012 ***Remember the Ladies*** – In 1776, Abigail Adams requested that her husband, future president John Adams, “remember the ladies” when establishing the government and the laws of the new nation. Examine the roles, responsibilities and daily activities of early American women.
- Apr. 19, 2012 ***The Rights of Youth*** – Imprisonment, whipping, forced transportation, and even death were some of the punishments that courts sentenced children to in the 18<sup>th</sup> century. Witness how justice was administered at a time when criminal laws and sentencing guidelines made few or no exceptions for children.

**\*RIGHTS: SC schools may view with 10-day fair use rights. (Can record, but program must be used within ten days and erased/destroyed within 45 days.) ONLY schools that get a scholarship through eMedia OR pay CWEFT to participate can keep the copy of the program(s) for the life of the tape/DVD, receive the guides, get online access, and have phone interaction with the historians.**

### **eMedia Special ... The Battle of Eutaw Springs - 1781**

The Battle of Eutaw Springs in Orangeburg County took place in 1781 and was important in the Patriot's cause in the Revolutionary War. This special program was created by eMedia to support the 2011 Social Studies Academic Standards since the battle is now included in what students should study. Please alert your social studies teachers to this new offering that focuses on Francis Marion and this important battle fought in the Revolutionary War on our South Carolina soil.

# **(NEW) A History of Black Achievement in America**

Repeats Feb. 2, 8:00 a.m.–12:06 p.m. IMC Also access online in *StreamlineSC*

**(This series has limited right rights, which means eMedia can only broadcast it once more this school year on date above. This is the only broadcast, but it can be accessed in *StreamlineSC*.)**

This eight-part series documents Black Achievement in American history, its defining role in the growth of the country, and its influence on current events. Presented by James Avery, the series highlights the many contributions of Black Americans that have influenced our culture, enriched our society with their achievements, and shaped the history of the United States. It's one of the least known stories in American history. It is the story of black achievement and accomplishment. Against all odds, American blacks have built their own institutions: families, schools, churches, and businesses. Against all odds, American blacks have created great art and science and fought heroically in every American war. Against all odds, black men and women have worked endlessly to secure their own freedom and equality. The untold Story of blacks in America is a 350-year saga of incredible achievements.

## **Program One: Settling the New World and Founding the United States of America**

1619 - 1621 - Blacks Arrive at Jamestown

1705 - The Virginia General Assembly Passes the Slave Codes

Produced by eMedia and ETV and directed by Pat Henry, these stories have been adapted with permission and input from author Idella Bodie. They are dramatizations of the stories from her book *South Carolina Women*. Recommended to support social studies standards for South Carolina history for elementary and middle grade students, the programs are also good for use during Women's History Month with students in grades 3–12. Each dramatization tells the story of women who have shaped SC history and politics. The stories have been produced at historical sites and homes.

### **(NEW) Program Eleven (two parts) – Dacey Langston**

A beloved American Revolutionary tale based on best-selling author Idella Bodie's book, the story of Dacey Langston is a tale of courage, sacrifice and determination. The year is 1781. British officer bloody Bill Cunningham and his band of scouts are plotting to attack in South Carolina's back country, the elder settlement and the continental army stationed nearby. Their plan is simple, leave no survivors. Dacey Langston was 14 years old when she became a spy for the American Patriots. Knowing that spies hanged for treason, Dacey risked her life to pass information along to her beloved brother James, an officer in the continental army, about Cunningham's plot to kill the residents and the soldiers. Dacey not only put herself into harm's way but also endangered her father, who realizes that his daughter has betrayed him by becoming a spy. But that isn't the only challenge that Dacey will face in this story. For this is also a story of a young girl falling in love for the first time. Through this story, students can journey back to a period where South Carolinians fought their own brothers and find out how this young woman was one of South Carolina's most courageous heroines. So renowned are the deeds of Dacey Langston that both a charter school and a DAR chapter are named after her. (This program is divided into two parts so be sure to access each part!)

## **Other Programs in Idella Bodie's SC Women Series**

### **Program One – Grace and Rachel Martin**

This is the story of two sisters-in-law living alone in the South Carolina back country who waylaid a British Courier with valuable papers by dressing up as colonial men. They risked their lives to stop the flow of information. Taped on location with historical costumes and artifacts, it takes place in the cabin considered to be the oldest frontier house still standing in SC.

### **Program Two – Emily Geiger**

Emily is a young girl who risked her life by serving as a messenger for the Colonial army during the Revolutionary War. Captured by the British and interrogated as a spy, she managed to trick Lord Rawdon into believing she was innocent, outwitting her captors in a most unique manner. Taped in part at the actual location where the interrogation took place, this drama covers the story of Emily's journey from her assignment with General Greene to her release by Lord Rawdon.

### **Program Three – Mary Chesnut**

Mary kept a diary during the turbulent times of the Civil War. This drama portrays various events in the life of the South Carolina heroine prior to and during the Civil War. The events dramatized are actual happenings that occurred to Mary and most of the words come straight from her diary. Mary actually spent time at Kensington Plantation, the location of the drama.

#### **Program Four – The Grimké Sisters**

Sarah Moore Grimké (1792–1873) and Angelina Emily Grimké (1805–1879), followed a similar path, speaking out about what they believed and leaving their home to join the fight for the causes of the abolition of slavery and equal rights for women. Today women are leaders in the community and in the business world, working along side their male counterparts in voicing and making their decisions, but it was not the same in the 1800's. These two sisters helped lead the way to change the course of history. From a young age they both stood up for what they believed were the wrongs of society. They spoke out against slavery, finding the courage to fight for their right to have a voice.

#### **Program Five – Wil Lou Gray**

Tells the story of Dr. Wil Lou Gray who began the South Carolina Opportunity School. The program follows her from the time that she was a young girl struggling with the loss of her dear mother through Dr. Gray's valiant efforts to get the Legislature to fund schooling for illiterate adults and children. Through reenactment of scenes in her life and interviews taped with Dr. Gray by ETV in the 1980's, we hear in Dr. Gray's own words her passion to help others to learn while we learn about what life was like during the early 1900's for many South Carolinians.

#### **Program Six – Mary McLeod Bethune (NOTE: Recommended for Black History Month)**

This is the story of one woman's struggle to gain equality for herself and her students. The drama begins with Mary as a young child growing up in rural South Carolina and concludes with her hard work to start a school for African American students in Florida. The struggle that Mary encountered just to be given the chance to learn to read and then to teach others, including being threatened with bodily harm is shown. The drama shows how she started with nothing and ended up being an advisor to a President!

#### **Program Seven – Modjeska Simkins (NOTE: Recommended for Black History Month)**

This is the story of an African American girl born to a half-white, half-black brick mason. She came from relative wealth and married into wealth, but dedicated her life to helping the disadvantaged to be treated equally. She was one of the organizers of the Supreme Court Case Briggs Vs. Elliott, which was the first filed of the four cases that later became combined Brown vs. Board of Education.

#### **Program Eight – Mary Gordon Ellis**

Mary Gordon Ellis was the first female to be elected to the South Carolina Legislature. This drama depicts her life from the challenges of being the school superintendent of Jasper County Schools where she addressed equality, making bold changes to impact education, to her time in office as an elected official until her untimely death at an early age.

#### **Program Nine – Dorcas Richardson**

The movie *The Patriot* was based loosely on Francis Marion fighting Colonel Banastre Tarleton in South Carolina during the American Revolutionary War. The Dorcas Richardson program tells the true story about one of Francis Marion's men, Richard Richardson, his wife Dorcas and their "battle" with Colonel Tarleton. Captain Richardson served under Francis Marion, better known as the Swamp Fox. After six years of fighting, Richard was left scarred from small pox and when he and his escort returned to his home, he discovered that Marion's enemy Tarleton was there, holding his wife Dorcas prisoner. This story depicts the courage and steadfast love of Dorcas Richardson for her family and her newly formed nation. Taped at Historic Camden, this story takes us back in time to where South Carolinians fought each other and the British. (\* Please preview before use.)

#### **Program Ten – Dr. Anne Austin Young**

Dr. Anne Austin Young fought the norm that women could not be at the top of their college class nor become a medical doctor. Anne was one of the first female doctors in South Carolina to practice medicine. This story covers her humble beginnings to later in life being inducted into the South Carolina Hall of Fame. Despite prejudice from both her family and community, Anne proved that women could succeed. Taped on location at several sites throughout the state, this drama inspires young people to achieve, despite any odds or prejudice. Dr. Anne Austin Young had many battles to win before being allowed into medical school. Even upon graduation, she faced prejudice that she wasn't good enough just because she was a woman. This story shows the many trials she encountered and worked to overcome in order to follow her dream.

## Jail No Bail – ETV Carolina Stories Program

Repeats Feb. 2, 8:00–8:27 p.m. ETV-HD

On January 31, 1961, ten black students from Friendship College walked into McCrory's Five and Dime in downtown Rock Hill, SC. They sat down at the lunch counter to order burgers and drinks. They were denied service and told to leave. When they refused, they were arrested and charged with trespassing. In previous sit-ins across the South, protestors were arrested, processed by the police, fined, and then released, creating a dubious revenue stream from which municipalities easily profited. But when the Friendship students went before the judge, they chose to serve their time behind bars. For the first time, not only did the city not collect money from the accused, but it actually had to pay to house and feed the men. Word of this action spread and received national attention. The "Jail, No Bail" strategy became the new tactic that helped galvanize the civil rights protest movement. Actor Keith David narrates the documentary that was produced by the staff at ETV Carolinas.

## Project Discovery – Commemorating the Orangeburg Massacre

Produced by eMedia with ETV, **Project Discovery** is an interactive electronic field trip that allows SC students to visit places and talk to experts, historians and other interesting people around our state. In February 2008 **Project Discovery** talked with key people and historians who gathered on the campus of South Carolina State University to commemorate The Orangeburg Massacre, as it would later be called, which occurred February 8, 1968 on the campus. While the events of that day played a part in what led to three students being killed and 27 injured, it was also the culmination of the preceding days' events that contributed to this tragic and sad time in our state's history. This program is recommended for middle/high school students studying SC and US history.

## Documentary on the Greensboro Four Repeats

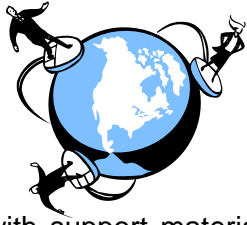

These modules are designed to assist educators in distinguishing between difficult state assessment items versus items that struggling students have the most challenges with; analyzing flagged state assessments; become familiar with guidelines for editing state assessment items for students with persistent learning difficulties; and learn how these guidelines can be used for making instruction more assessable to learners with diverse needs.



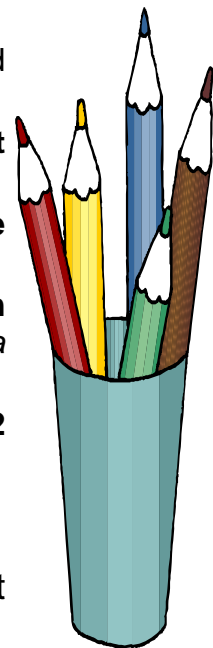
